Simple but elegant and vibrant designs, machine pieced and hand quilted. Third generation quilter from Gee's Bend Alabama. Descendent from slaves that used materials they had to make quilts for warmth and home use. The quilting tradition is passed down through the generations. Many of the Gee's Bend quilts are in various museums as well as the Smithsonian Institution.

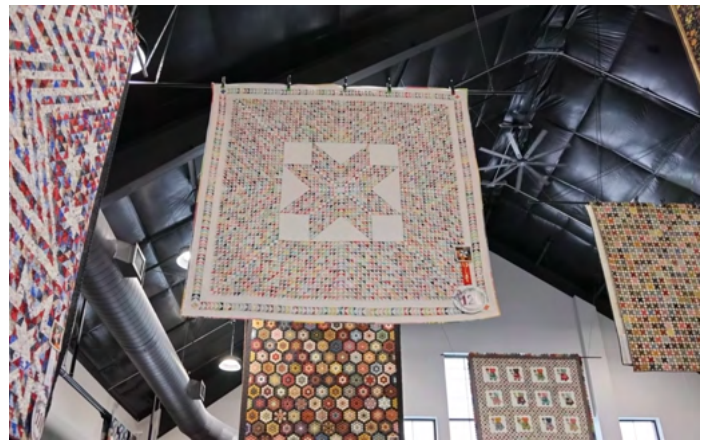

February 2026

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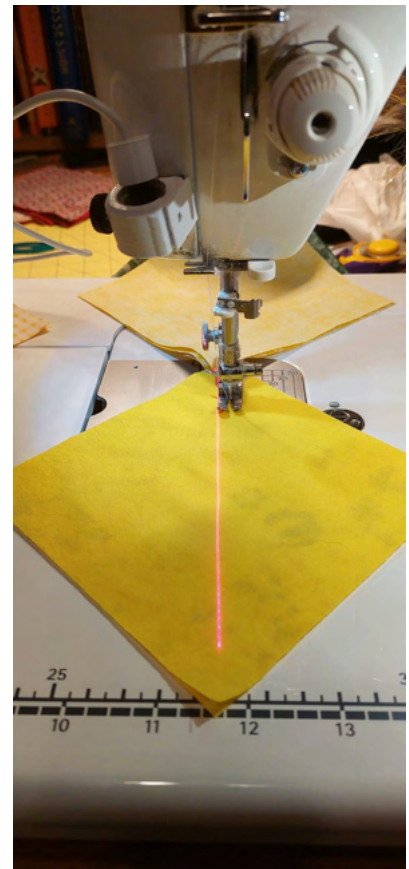


Teri Justice will be sharing her tips for English paper piecing and hand embroidery. She will have sample blocks to share and a trunk show of some of her favorite quilts.

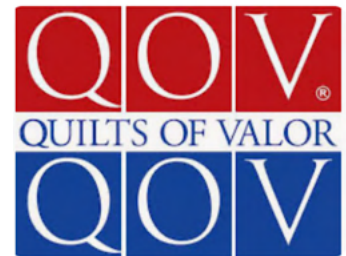
**May 2026**

Cotton Patch Quilt Guild Challenge 2026 – Quilting Bucket List

Instructions: Do you have a “Quilting Bucket List”? You may not call it that, but we all have some sort of running list of things we want to learn or try to expand our quilting skills. It may be a new technique we want to try, a challenging quilt block, a fuzzy idea of a design for a project that uses something we’ve saved – such as a stack of vintage hankies, or even an intriguing pattern we bought long ago from a guild meeting speaker. For this challenge, you will create a wall-hanging sized quilt that uses something from your own quilting bucket list. It doesn’t matter what you choose as long as you can identify what you set out to learn from the project. This is not a challenge to complete one of your UFOs; the focus is on learning something new.



Size Limit: The quilt should be designed as a wall-hanging – no larger than 40” per side.

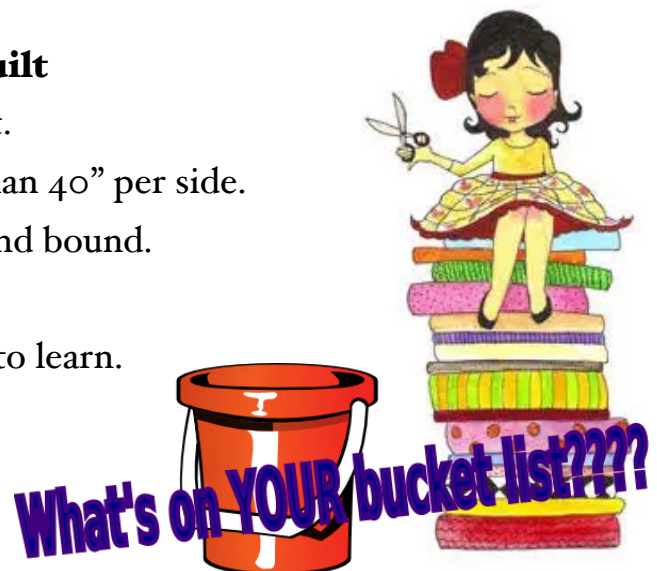
Due-date: Quilts will be displayed at our June, 2026 Guild Meeting. Pin a card to the lower right corner of the quilt including a phrase or sentence describing what you set out to learn and cross off your bucket list. Do not include your name on the card. If your name is on a label on the quilt back, please cover it with tape or paper.

Important Tips for Entering Your Quilt

- Plan to arrive early to check-in your quilt.
- Size Matters! Quilts must be no larger than 40” per side.
- Your quilt must be Complete – quilted and bound.

THE RECIPE

3 cups water

1 teaspoon salt

3 heaping tablespoons flour

1 cup rubbing alcohol (or vodka)

clean spray bottle (I bought one for about \$3 in the cleaning section at target; a well rinsed Best Press bottle would probably work, too)

Combine 2 cups water and 1 tsp salt in a pot and bring to a boil. Meanwhile, combine 1 cup water and 3 heaping tablespoons flour in a jar or well sealed tupperware, and shake to mix. When the water and salt boils, turn down to a gentle boil and add flour and water. Cook on medium-ish until the mixture thickens like gravy (stir it so it doesn't stick!). Remove from heat and let cool to room temperature (I poured mine out of the pot and into a pyrex mixing bowl with a spout, so it would be ready to pour into the spray bottle. When the mixture is cool, pour it into the spray bottle and add 1 cup rubbing alcohol. Shake well to mix.

Meeting Minutes

January 2026 •

January 12, 2026

Tonight's meeting was called to order at 6:00 pm by Guild President Carol Ann Burns.

Members that signed in: 44

Three guests were present: Phil Johnson, Kathy Conway & JoAnn Stulz. Kathy & JoAnn became members tonight.

Tonight's delicious refreshments were provided by Barb Bauer, Rosie Crockett, Beverly Evans, Anne Flippen, Susan Herda, Sylvia Hurst, Carol Johnson, Shary Karlin, Marian Newcomer, Marcie Simpson, & Sylvia Wilson. Thank you all for the delectable treats! The room was vacuumed by Diana Timperio. Thank you, Diana!

Guild Business & Announcements:

- Hearing no objections or corrections, the December 2025 minutes & treasury report were approved as written in the newsletter.
- Susan Herda made an announcement about the Quilt of Valor Sew Day on Feb 7, 2026, at the Oconee County Veterans' Park Senior Center. It will be from 10:00-4:00. There will be a potluck. Coffee & hot tea will be available. The National Quilt of Valor Sew Day is on the first Saturday in February. Susan & Phyllis Rother showed a quilt that Charlene had made & Sylvia Wilson quilted. On the National Sew Day, all QOV groups everywhere sew together. Drawings will be held nationally throughout the day for prizes. Phyllis stated that in 2025, 118 quilts were awarded by our group.
- Karry Weaver made an announcement that there were foundation paper patterns printed out up front. The first workshop will be on January 17, 2026. She said she would keep us updated if her plans changed because she is expecting a new grandchild at any time.
- Karry introduced Sally Mixon of the Gee's Bend Quilting Community. Sally was in a Zoom meeting. She started by telling us where Gee's Bend is. It is situated between Selma & Camden, Alabama. She said it is surrounded on 3 sides by water & there is a ferry to get to it. It is a small rural area. She started at 12 years old, helping her mom thread needles. Quilts were made to keep them warm & old clothing was used because resources were scarce. Her mom had a total of 14 kids. Her mom would quilt by hand & use cotton from the fields to make the quilts. While her mom would quilt, she told of her early life. Sally learned to hem & take in clothing items from her mom. Once Sally went off to school & college, she got away from sewing & quilting. In the early 2000's, Sally developed a lung disease & was feeling really down & depressed. Her little sister told her she needed to get sewing again. Today, Sally has a quilt she made hanging in the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C. There is another quilt she made in a museum

in Austin, Texas. A man from England came & bought 2 quilts from her & now they are in a museum of art in England. Sally said this will be the 4th year of the Airing of the Quilts in Gee's Bend. People are able to buy quilts at this event. She stated that a lot of younger people are not interested in keeping up the quilting traditions. She is worried about it not being continued on through the generations. Today, she mostly makes baby-sized quilts. Recently, a quilt was made for a lady who was a descendant of a slave who was on the last slave ship found, the Catilda. That quilt now hangs in the welcome center in Gee's Bend. The quilt was made up of blocks made by each quilter in Gee's Bend. Sally is a 4th generation of Gee's Bend quilters. Sally was asked about what materials she sources for quilts. She said she mainly uses cotton for the quilts. She showed us some samples of quilts she has done recently. They were mostly brightly colored solids & some print fabric was added in on a few. Some of the names of quilts were Blocks, Sweep Quilt, & Lazy Gal or Cow. She will sometimes use the scraps of quilts to make other quilt tops. In the old days, women made the clothes, quilts, grew their own food, & raised their own chicken & pigs. They would use wood-burning stoves. Sally machine pieces her quilts & hand quilts them. She said she usually uses Pellon or 100% brown cotton batting for quilts because that makes them warmer. Her price range on quilts is \$125-\$250. The simpler the pattern, the cheaper the quilt. She was asked how her quilt ended up in the Smithsonian. She said they were looking for quilts from the Black Belt & from a descendant of a Gee's Bend quilter. Sally pieced the top & her sister quilted it. The quilt was called Blocks & Strips. She was asked if she had any of her grandmother's quilts. She said she didn't because of a house fire in the 1980's. She was asked if there were any male quilters. She said there weren't any men quilting. One of her brothers wanted to learn but passed away before he could. She was asked how she cuts her fabric. She uses a pair of scissors. She showed a quilt that she called a Brick Layer Quilt. She irons it as she goes to help the fabric lay properly. She said it is time-consuming but joyous. She said quilting keeps the mind occupied from what bothers you & is calming. Her mother had her when she was in her 40's. Her mom was in her 50's when she had her brother. She said at one point, one of her sister's & mother had babies at the same time. She was asked if she had a sewing group. She is trying to get a group started. She stated that the population of Gee's Bend today is around 280 people. Back in the day, the population was 1500-2000 people. At one time, there was a high school & elementary school there. The high school closed just as she was reaching high school. For high school, she was bused down to Pine Hill, Alabama, in Wilcox County. She said there are 2 quilters still in Gee's Bend. She still owns her mother's house there in Gee's Bend. She stays there when she visits. They do have a post office in Gee's Bend, but no longer have a Co-Op. They are still in the process of getting fire hydrants there. It is still poor & rural there. They have to

travel to see doctors & hospitals. They lose people because of the distance to help. There is a clinic in Alberta that is 20 minutes away, but no ER. She shops mostly at Hobby Lobby for fabric now. The people in Gee's Bend mostly buy fabrics from Wal-Mart or from donations. She said Amazon does deliver to Gee's Bend. They did get a 911 system after the roads were all finally named. Sally now lives in Huntsville, Alabama. She said that other quilts from other Gee's Bend quilters are in the Smithsonian & other museums. On October 3, 2026, they will have the 5th Airing of the Quilts in Gee's Bend. There will be a mix of old & new quilts. There was a Freedom Quilting Bee that her mother & sister were a part of. She remembers one time her sister got a \$98 check for a whole week of work. She said that at one time Sears bought their quilts. They made hoodies for Ralph Lauren & Target. She said Adidas also bought quilts.

- Carol Ann Burns said that Karry Weaver won a second-place Primitive Gatherings Award with national recognition. Congratulations, Karry!! It was for Karry's quilt that had 3,272 half-square triangles & 356 flying geese. Karry said it took her almost 11 months to make it.

- Sue Lawrence spoke about the Janet Rankin Foundation having a charity event on April 1-14, 2026, in Winterville at the Cultural Center. She said there is a sign-up sheet to pledge a quilt & write the size you will be making to donate to the event. There are also CPQG quilt labels that need to be sewn on the quilts.

- Laura Leiden told about the new quilt challenge on Betsy Vonk's behalf. The new challenge is based on your quilting bucket list. It can be a new skill you want to expand on or make with something you have saved for a long time, like hankies. The quilt should be wall-hanging size & no bigger than 40" per side. The quilts are due at the June guild meeting. The quilts need to be completely completed, quilted & bound. Pin a card in the lower right corner of the quilt, including a description of what you set out to cross off your bucket list. If your name is on a label, please put tape over it.
